




Supplemental Images #1 & #2—Cooper's Hawk (right) and Sharp-shinned Hawk (left). How do you tell them apart? That's not a bad question. But, first, make sure they're even accipiters! Despite the rather disheveled look of these two hawks, we can be certain that they are accipiters; note how their wingtips barely extend beyond the undertail coverts.
